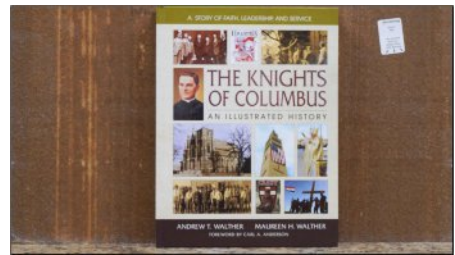

“KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HISTORY” – A STORY OF FAITH, LEADERSHIP AND SERVICE



In the August 2020 newsletter, we started a monthly column about the history of the Knights of Columbus. It is based on the recently released book, The Knights of Columbus: An Illustrated History. It is not simply a record of yesterday’s harvest, but it also contains within it the seeds of a future filled with promise. Taken comprehensively, the book provides a kind of decoding key, facilitating the type of understanding or – in the case of the Members – self-understanding that is foundational to knowing what the Knights of Columbus is, why it has been able to

Establishing the Order

In On March 29, 1882, the Order of Knights of Columbus was legally incorporated by the State of Connecticut. But getting approval proved no smooth task. Early in March 1882, the group submitted for approval a draft containing both reference to its Christian faith and a detailed explanations of its vision of service to widows, orphans and its members:

“ . . . having for its objects Fraternity, Unity and true Christian Charity amongst its members. And for the purpose of raising and maintain a fund so as to enable us to give substantial assistance in time of sickness and distress, and to make suitable provision for their decent burial in Case of Death, and to make further provision for the widows and orphans, and to do all in our power to further the interests of our fellow members.”

When the state rejected their proposal, revised articles of

incorporation – with a much pared-down explanation of its purpose – were adopted on March 29, 1882.

On May 15, 1882, the first Council was formed. It was named the San Salvador Council after the first New World island discovered by Christopher Columbus. Father McGivney, along with the other Members of the Order, signed the first Charter.

James T. Mullen’s – who presided over the first meeting – previous fraternal experience with the Red Knights and his familiarity with ceremonials made him a good candidate for Grand Knight of the San Salvador Council. Many fraternal organizations never made it out of the early stages, and disbanded, but Mullen helped guide the fledging new organization through its infancy.

Members of San Salvador Council No. 1 were both enthusiastic about moving forward with their own Council and anxious for the organization to grow. With the help of Father McGivney, they began outward for places to establish new Councils. As Supreme Knight for four years, Mullen would oversee the early expansion of the Order.

Initially, growth was slow, but Father McGivney remained a persistent advocate for a robust, developing organization. Once expansion began, it quickly continued. In 1883, the Order’s second Council was formed in Meriden. The Council was named Silver City, as Meriden was home to a number of businesses and manufacturers that worked with the precious metal. Councils 3, 4 and 5 soon followed in Middletown, Meriden and Wallingford, respectively. Within the next two years, the number of Councils in the towns and cities throughout Connecticut grew to two dozen.

The need for the Order was clear. One Member from Chicago, Charles Conley, later reflected, “At the first meeting of the Chicago Council, I realized the establishment of the Knights of Columbus, with the sanction of the Church, was a long step forward, and must tend to promote a fraternal spirit among Church militant, which for so long was lacking.”

Even with the ongoing coronavirus restrictions, the Pancake Breakfasts continue being successful. Like the

January 24th event, the March 14th Pancake Breakfast served nearly 100 customers – even on a carryout basis. We hope that you will come and support the April 18th event.

The Pancake Breakfast Carryout Menu consists of three pancakes, three sausages, two scrambled eggs, a packet of pancake syrup, two butter cups and plastic cutlery (knife, fork, napkin and salt and pepper packets). The children’s meal contains one less pancake and sausage. All the food is packaged in a Styrofoam container. And the price for all this great food is only \$5.00 – \$2.00 for children age 12 and under!

The Pancake Breakfast will be served between 8:00 am – 11:00 am. Parishioners can walk over after Mass, or drive their car under the Finegan Center Portico, pay their money and pick up a “hot” meal. Pancake Breakfasts will be held on May 16th and June 20th.

FOOD COLLECTION DRIVE**

The Incarnation Knights and the St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP)/ Incarnation Conference will conduct another food collection drive in late April. Since the two organizations formed their partnership last June, four drives have

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been conducted. And thanks to the very generous Incarnation Parishioners, nearly 7,000 pounds of food and over \$5,000 in donations have been collected.

It is time to replenish "Vincent's Cupboard," so SVDP can continue to serve its many clients. Drive-up donations will be accepted under the portico of the Finegan Center on Saturday, April 24th from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm and Sunday, April 25th from 8:00 am until noon. Knights and Vincentians will be gloved and masked to take your non-perishable food donations. There will be no need to get out of your car. Just pop your trunk, and one of the volunteers will be glad to take your donations right out of your trunk.

So, during the next few weeks when you are grocery shopping, please purchase something extra to donate to the food drive. Items most in demand are Chef Boyardee spaghetti, ravioli, beefaroni, and spaghetti and meatballs; pasta sauce; canned chicken; canned fruit; soups; peanut butter; kitchen garbage bags; disinfecting wipes; dish soap; laundry soap; tissues; paper towels and toilet paper. Financial donations will also be accepted to purchase additional food.

2021 ORIOLES SPRING TRAINING  
BASEBALL SUCCESSFUL IN  
SPITE OF ALL THE CHALLENGES



The "March Tradition" of Incarnation Council 15332 and St. Thomas More Council 7826 operating a concession stand at Ed Smith Stadium during the 2021 Spring Training Baseball Season started with much uncertainty. – all because of the continuing coronavirus.

It took Major League Baseball (MLB) and the MLB Players Union five months to reach various protocols, which included the following: Spring Training Schedule reduced from 16 to 14 games; a 25 percent maximum capacity at stadiums; no paper tickets, only digital; no cash, only credit cards accepted for any purchases in stadiums and masks must worn all times, except for eating.

So how did these changes impact the Incarnation/St. Thomas More concession stand. First off, the Councils lost their stand for this Spring Training Season. MLB decided that team clubhouses with kitchen facilities for cooking meals

could not be used. As such, Nick Tamburello, the Orioles Concessionaire had to take over our concession stand so the Orioles cooking staff could prepare and cook the team's meals. Our concession stand is the only one that has the most extensive kitchen facilities in the stadium.

So where did we go? Nick was very accommodating. He assigned us the outside First Base Patio Grill Stand, which was not too far from our regular concession stand. It was the only stand open on the lower concourse except the third base concession stand. It was in a great location because it brought fans sitting on the shady side of the stadium.

Originally, our regular concession stand was only going to operate with 14 volunteers this year versus 21 as in previous years. With the coronavirus restrictions, the stand menu was

reduced and catering operations were eliminated. The First Base Patio Grill Stand, however, only required eight volunteers – four from each Council. There were two grill chefs, two food preparers, two counter servers and two cashiers.

The menu included jumbo hot dogs, kosher dogs, hamburgers, cheeseburgers, sausage with peppers & onions and grilled chicken. In addition, the concession stand served potato chips, popcorn and peanuts. For drinks, the stand sold 20 oz. bottled soda, water and Gatorade; 20 oz. draft domestic beer; and 16 oz. domestic and imported bottled beer.

The success of the 2021 Spring Training Season was all due to the great work and commitment of the volunteers from each Council. This year, 15 Brothers and one Lady worked the 14 ball games. From Incarnation Council, Grand Knight Dr Steve Wyer, Financial Secretary/Spring Training Baseball Director, Trustee Dale Haas PGK PFN, Steve Christie PGK PFN and Brother Paul Turner worked every game. Lady Teresa Wyer worked all the weekend and night games.

St. Thomas More Council had ten volunteers working the games.

Thanks to Grand Knight Ken Berberich, Deputy Grand Knight Jim Meyd, Chancellor Ralph Neller and Brothers Denny Armstrong, Charlie Ballschmieder, Rob Carver, Gary Elis, John Malloy, Jack Rodman and Johnnie Turner PGK for all their hard work.

This was the tenth year of the Incarnation Council and St. Thomas More Council partnership in operating a Spring Training Concession Stand for the Baltimore Orioles. It has been an excellent example of Knights working together for the greater good. To celebrate our 2021 success, the 15 Brothers and Lady Teresa Wyer will be getting together in April to enjoy a good meal and some beverages.

Hopefully, we will return to normal for the 2022 Spring Training Season.

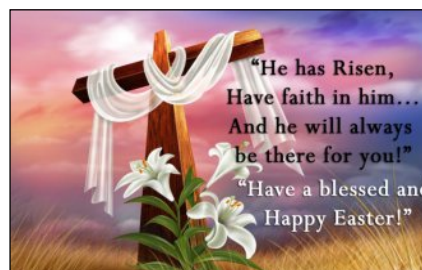
