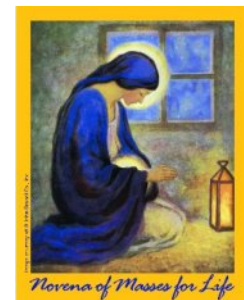

Mothers’ Day Roses



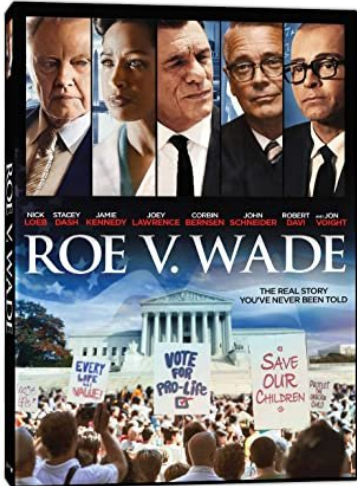

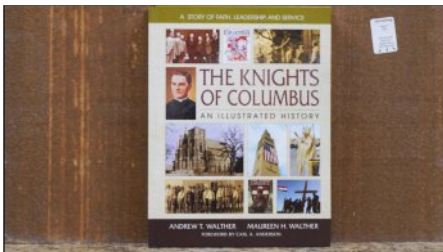
Council Brother can now order a badge for his wife. It also costs \$10.00. It takes about 10-14 days to receive badge orders.

“KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HISTORY” – A STORY OF FAITH, LEADERSHIP AND SERVICE



In August 2020 newsletter, we started a monthly column about the history of the Knights of Columbus. It is based on the book, The Knights of Columbus: An Illustrated History. It is not simply a record of yesterday's

harvest, but it also contains within it the seeds of a future filled with promise. Taken comprehensively, the book provides a kind of decoding key, facilitating the type of understanding or – in the case of the Members – self-understanding that is foundational to knowing what the Knights of Columbus is, why it has been able to achieve so much, and what it might be capable of achieving in the future.

Spreading the Word – “The Columbia Magazine”

In November 1893, the Columbiad Publishing Company in Boston printed the first issue of a monthly newspaper called The Columbiad. The paper was dedicated to providing information about the interests and activities of the Knights of Columbus. Thomas H Cummings, who from 1893 to 1895 served the Order as the National Director of Ceremonies and later served as National Organizer, was named the first editor. Well-known Catholic lecturer Christopher I Fitzgerald was appointed the business manager. An annual subscription was \$1.

In 1898, magazine publisher Daniel Toomey purchased The Columbiad. Within five years, he had established the publication as the official magazine of the Order. It provided communications from the National

Council, the Board of Directors and various committees to the membership.

In August 1921, the Knights took over the publication and changed the name to Columbia. From that point, the magazine was managed entirely by the staff of the Supreme Office. A printing press was installed in the building to facilitate production. While maintaining its Catholic nature, the magazine expanded its focus to become more than a simple news service for the Order. Along with newsworthy articles, it began including items like short stories and interviews with notable personalities all to appeal to a broader audience – members as well as non-members, and men as well as women.

In 1955, over thirty and several editors later, Columbia underwent a format change. The magazine's page count doubled, while its dimensions were reduced from a large-size format to that of a standard magazine. With a circulation of 900,000, Columbia rivaled major publications of its time. A new plant was built to accommodate its steadily growing circulation. When news of the forthcoming inaugural issue of the revamped Columbia was announced, it was greeted by a letter from the Vatican Secretary of State. The letter extended the personal good wishes of

the Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, who was chosen to appear on the cover of the newly formatted magazine's first issue.

Today, with a circulation of 1.7 million, Columbia continues to be the leading source of information about the Knights of Columbus. It is distributed in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Poland, the Philippines, Puerto Rico and countries in the Caribbean and along the Pacific Rim.

In addition to its English edition, the magazine is published in French and Spanish with an abbreviated Polish version. Although Columbia's readership consists mainly of members and their families, it is geared toward a general Catholic audience.

COME ENJOY THE NEXT PANCAKE BREAKFAST INSIDE THE FINEGAN CENTER



On April 18th, the Council held its last Carryout Pancake Breakfast. Even

with the coronavirus restrictions, the Council served 70 meals. We thank all the Incarnation Parishioners who supported the Carryout Pancake Breakfasts during the past few months.

Thanks to Father Eric, he has given the Council permission to serve Incarnation Parishioners once again a hot and delicious Pancake Breakfast inside the Finegan Center beginning May 16th. The Council will follow strict protocols for serving food and sitting patrons three feet apart, except for families.

With the return of serving sit-down meals, the Council can return to its full Pancake Breakfast Menu. As such, the Pancake Breakfast Cooking Crew will be serving a meal that consists of pancakes, linked sausages and scrambled eggs. Sausage biscuits will also be available.

Apple juice and coffee will also return. While we have always poured the apple juice for our patrons, we must also pour their coffee. There will be sugar packets and packaged creamers available. If you want hot syrup for your pancakes, we will be serving it. If not, we will have pancake syrup

packets available. Unfortunately, the Council cannot serve the orange wedges or chocolate chip morsels at this time.

Since the Council is returning to its expanded menu, the price for all this great food will be \$6.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children age 12 and under.

BREAKING NEWS! Beginning May 18th, the Pancake Breakfast will be served between 8:00 am – 1:00 pm. This will allow Parishioners attending the 11:00 am Mass to enjoy a hot breakfast after Mass. The Council will operate the expanded service for at least two months to ascertain if parishioners will support it.

The Council hopes that the Council Brothers and their families will come support the May 18th Pancake Breakfast.

COUNCIL AND ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY CONTINUE SUCCESSFUL FOOD COLLECTION DRIVES

Last June, Incarnation Council and the St. Vincent De Paul Society (SVDP)/Incarnation Conference established a partnership. It was decided that the two organizations

would work together on food drives to benefit the SVDP clients. With the current Covid-19 pandemic, the SVDP has a great need for food to provide its clients.

On Saturday, April 24th and Sunday, April 25th, the Council and SVDP conducted their fifth food collection drive of the 2020 – 2021 Fraternal Year. It was another highly successful event, which resulted in 2,573 pounds of food being collected and \$1,670 in donations being received. The Council donated \$500.00.

For the year, the five food collection drives resulted in over 9,300 pounds of food being collected and over \$6,600 in donations being received.

These food collection drives would not have been a success without all the great work of 116 Incarnation Knights, SVDP Vincentians, Incarnation Catholic School Students and Cardinal Mooney High School Students who provided 416 volunteer hours to conduct these five events.

Under the Supreme Council's Food for Families Program, a Council will be reimbursed \$100 for every 1,000

pounds of food collected and \$100 for donations totaling more than \$500. The maximum amount that a Council can receive during the fraternal year is \$500. The Council reached these goals after the January 2021 drive. Financial Secretary Charlie Culkin filed the required reimbursement forms, and the Council received the Supreme reimbursement check in March.

The Council and SVDP have scheduled future food collection drives on July 31 - August 1, October 23 - 24, January 8 - 9 and April 23 - 24.

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**2021 SPRING TRAINING
BASEBALL SEASON CONCLUDES
WITH VOLUNTEER COOKOUT**



For the tenth consecutive year, Incarnation Council 15332 and St. Thomas More Council 7826 operated a concession stand at Ed Smith Stadium during the 2021 Spring Training Baseball Season. Although the season started with much uncertainty. – all because of the continuing coronavirus – it ended very successfully.

This season, we could not work our regular concession stand because it was taken over by the Baltimore

Orioles cooking staff. Major League Baseball decided that team clubhouses with kitchen facilities could not be used for cooking meals. Our stand is the only one that has the most extensive kitchen facilities in the stadium.

So where did we go? We operated the First Base Patio Grill Stand, which was not too far from our regular concession stand. It was the only stand open on the lower concourse except the third base stand. It was in a great location because it brought fans sitting on the shady side of the stadium.

So how did we do? The Patio Grill Stand rang up \$77,309 in sales. This earned the two Councils \$7,230 in commissions. In addition, the Council collected \$1,735 in tips. Each Council received \$4,482.

The success of the 2021 Spring Training Season was all due to the great work and commitment of the volunteers from each Council. This year, 15 Brothers and one Lady worked the 14 ball games. From Incarnation Council, Grand Knight Dr Steve Wyer, Financial Secretary/Spring Training Baseball Director Charlie Culkin, Trustee Dale Haas PGK PFN, Steve Christie PGK PFN and Brother Paul Turner worked every game. Lady Teresa Wyer worked all the weekend and night games. St. Thomas More Council had ten volunteers work the games. Thanks to Grand Knight Ken Berberich, Deputy Grand Knight Jim Meyd, Chancellor Ralph Neller and Brothers Denny Armstrong, Charlie Ballschmieder, Rob Carver, Gary Elis, John Malloy, Jack Rodman and Johnnie Turner PGK for all their hard work.

To celebrate all these volunteers hard work, Incarnation Council hosted a “Thank You Cookout” on Wednesday evening, April 14th. The event was held outside on the east end of the Finegan Center in the parking lot. Grand Knight Dr Steven Wyer recruited Deputy Grand Knight Matt Dowell, and his wife Christine, and

BINGO ENDS AND MONTHLY DINNERS BEGIN

Incarnation Bingo has come to an end. For eight of the past ten years, the Council has been involved in operating Bingo for the Incarnation School and Parish. Unfortunately, the event is no longer profitable for the manpower required to operate it.

In September 2011 – shortly after the Council was formed – Brothers and their wives began helping Incarnation School parents operate the weekly games during the school year. Unfortunately, the school dropped Bingo in May 2015. After a year with no Bingo, the Council restarted it in September 2016 on a monthly basis.

The first year was successful with an average of 132 customers. Over the following three years, however, attendance dropped – 98 customers during Fraternal Year 2019 – 2020. To keep the games somewhat profitable, the basic game prize of \$50 was dropped to \$35 over the years. On some nights, food sales and the 50/50 raffle netted more money than the Bingo games. The last Bingo night in February 2020 only 63 customers attended.

After much discussion with those operating Bingo, the Council decided to drop Bingo. It was not an easy decision because it was a staple at the School and Parish for so many years.

After the Council took over Bingo, she was the Bingo Co-Director with Charlie Culkin until it ended. Thank you Mary for your dedication and the many, many hours

that you devoted to Bingo. You were the best!!

To fill the Bingo gap, the Council will be initiating a monthly Parish Family Dinner on the second Friday of the month, except during December and Lenten Fish Fries. The first dinner will be on Friday, May 14th. It will be a sit-down meal in the Finegan Center. The Council will follow strict protocols for serving food and sitting patrons three feet apart, except for families.

The meal will be served between 5:00 pm and 7:00 pm. Carryout meals will also be available. The May menu will include hamburgers, hot dogs, chicken fingers/nuggets, french fries, potato salad, lemonade and iced tea. The cost will be \$9.00 for adults and \$4.00 for children age 12 and under.

During Fraternal Year 2021 – 2022, the Council is planning nine monthly Parish Family Dinners and six Lenten Fish Fries. These will be major Council fund-raising events. The Council hopes that its Brothers and their families will be support these events.
